While he was on the combine, he heard rafters fall and he decided he needed to get out of the barn. He suffered 3rd degree burns on 10% of his body. The burns were on his forearms, neck, face and ears. He spent 8 days in the hospital having 1 surgery to move some skin from his hip to the burns. The pain was so bad that he was put out every day to have them cleaned and packed. Hs also had vacuums on his arms to help the skin underneath grow over the wounds.

Gus persevered through the pain and healing in time for football season. He practiced and played the whole season and was named defensive lineman of the year for the Mustangs. He was also named to the Homecoming Court this year as well. He continues to work on the family farm running the chopper, mechanical work and helped build the new barn. In the past he has been involved in 4-H, including showing animals at the Hemlock Fair, he has volunteered his time helping at church dinners and helped the **Livingston County Dairy Princess** Program when his sisters were involved. He has remained positive throughout his life and is always there to make you laugh. Since the fire, he has realized that he is not invincible and every day has a new enthusiasm for life. Food Control Bill 1917

The name of this act was An Act to
Provide Further for the National
Security and Defense by Encouraging
the Production, Conserving the
Supply, and Controlling the
Distribution of Food Products and
Fuel. This act became law on August
10, 1917 and the short title was the
Lever Food Act.

The act allowed the president to regulate the price, production, transportation and allocation of feeds, food, fuel and beverages and distilled spirits for the remainder of World War I. The president was also empowered to nationalize certain private factories and requisition storage facilities for military supplies. Private individuals and proprietors were entitled to be compensated for the fair market value of property taken.

The act banned the production of "distilled spirits" from any produce that was used for food. It was an emergency wartime measure and was designed to expire at the end of World War I. This was done to conserve food and fuel so the Americans could feed themselves, their growing army and their allies.

Herbert Hoover was named the head of the Food Administration. He had the authority to fix food prices, license distributors, coordinate purchases, oversee exports, act against hoarding and encourage farmers to grow more crops. He emphasized the needs of our allies for American produce and

encouraged American households to consume less meat and bread. There were voluntary "meatless Tuesdays" and "sweetless Saturdays", also Tuesdays and Saturdays were "porkless", Mondays and Wednesdays would be "wheatless". Compliance was voluntary however the baking industry, hotels and restaurants, were limited to war bread and rolls which were called "victory bread and rolls".

The effectiveness of the rules depended solely on the goodwill of the American people. They had to depend on the co-operation of the trades. Hoover stated that there was but one police force – the American woman - to organize in co-operation with our state and local Food Administrators to see that the rules are obeyed. Citizens grew victory gardens, children were organized into United States School Garden Army, Boy Scouts were urged to be "patriotic to the core" when eating apples and slogans like "By all means, save the beans" became popular. During the first year Americans reduced their food consumption by 15%.

Harry Garfield, director of the Fuel Administration, directed efforts to save coal, oil and gas. Citizens were encouraged to save fuel with "gasless" Sundays, "heatless" Mondays and "lightless" nights.

The Fuel Administration ended in May 1919 and the Food Administration Quickly declined after the Armistice of November 11, 1918. The act was repealed on March 3, 1921.
